In the next few weeks, Ealing Council will place bags over traffic lights at seven junctions in the borough in a six-month experiment to see if removing traffic lights speeds traffic flow. The move, the first in Britain, follows London Mayor, Boris Johnson's complaints at being stuck at traffic lights on a car journey through Ealing a few weeks ago.

The decision has raised concerns of safety for pedestrians and cyclists. However it is possible that there will be fewer casualties at the junctions. In the late 1990's, pioneering road traffic engineer, Hans Monderman, removed traffic lights from junctions in the Dutch town of Drachten. Up to then, the town had experienced an average of three road traffic deaths a year. In the following seven years there were

There is one crucial difference beteween Ealing's experiment and that in Holland. Monderman didn't just remove the traffic lights, he carefully redesigned the streets so that drivers, cyclists and pedestrians made eye contact with each other. We will know in six months whether Ealing's cutprice version is as safe.

The seven Junctions losing their lights

- 1. Western Road with Montague Way, South-
- 2. King Street and Western Road/Havelock Road, Southall
- 3. Windmill Lane/Windmill Avenue and St. Bernard's Hospital access, Southall
- 4. Gunnersbury Lane with Bollo Lane, Acton
- 5. Acton Lane/North Acton Road and Barrets Green Road, Acton
- 6. Ruislip Road and Greenford Avenue, Hanwell/Cleveland
- 7. Twyford Avenue and Creffield Road, Acton

Boris Johnson is considering whether to legalise cyclists turning left at traffic signals even when they are red. In Ealing Cycling Campaign's response earlier this year, we said:

"This is a measure which we support, provided it is made totally clear that pedestrians who are still crossing on their green phase have priority. This arrangement operates satisfactorily in other countries - indeed in the USA right turn on red is the norm, subject to the proviso that pedestrians have priority.

Similarly, cyclists should be allowed to pass a red light at pedestrian crossings once all pedestrians have cleared.

This proposal is particularly applicable in outer London where at times there are often no pedestrians, and it would help everyone to allow cyclists to get on their way in advance of general traffic.

The corollary is that when pedestrians have a "red man" signal at a crossing, they should always give priority to traffic - something that sadly often does not happen when cyclists are approaching, apparently invisibly to pedestrians.

If all these measures are presented as a package they will be more acceptable to the public."

More recently, Boris's suggestion has been dismissed by the Cyclists Touring Club as an empty headline, that is unlikely to be accepted by Department for Transport and that is distracting effort from more important issues. What do you think? London's track record in leading the rest of UK on such issues has been good, including the congestion charge, the Oyster card covering all travel modes, and cycle-friendly measures such as allowing contraflow cycling in some streets. Have other countries that allow turning on red really got it so wrong that our DfT will dismiss the idea?
